CONVENTION REGISTRATION

REGISTRATION: Advance registration, for the weekend, is \$20 per person before July 10th. After that, the fee is \$30. We urge everyone to pre-register before July 10th. This is especially important if you wish to camp since the availability of camping permits is only guaranteed through advance registration to people who have also prepaid their admission fee. No refunds will be issued after Aug 7th.

CAMPING: The camping fee is an additional \$30 per site. Campsites are limited to one vehicle and one tent/camper.

LARGE CAMPERS: Towed campers and RVs longer than 17 FEET when being driven (not after setup) require a special permit to attend the convention. The fee for the permit is \$50, which includes the camping fee. If you require such a permit you must contact us before July 10th. Large campers are absolutely required to arrive, and be in place at the convention site, between Noon and 4 p.m. on Thursday and, once parked, may not move until Sunday morning! Please note that only people with a large camper and a large camper permit will be admitted on Thursday. No exceptions! Large campers that do not have a permit will not be admitted to the convention site at any time! Please check the appropriate box on the registration card and mail it in as soon as possible. The permit will be mailed to the address on your registration card.

If you choose, you may register for the convention online at www.stellafane.com using PayPal (www.paypal.com).

WHAT TO DO: If you are not going to register online mark the appropriate information on the enclosed registration card and mail it with a check, for the full amount, payable to the *Springfield Telescope Makers* to: Stellafane, P. O. Box 50, Belmont, MA 02478. Everyone, except family members under 16 years of age accompanied by an adult, must pay to attend. Absolutely no registrations will be processed after July 26th. All requests after that time must be handled when you arrive.

SUMMARY:

- 1) Adults: \$20 before July 10th, \$30 thereafter.
- 2) Family members under 16 with an adult: Free.
- 3) Camping: \$30 per site with an adult registration.
- 4) Towed campers and RVs longer than 17 feet: \$50.

- 6) Children's groups: Must contact us before July 10th!

GETTING ON THE 2005 MAILING LIST: The only way to get on the mailing list for the 2005 convention is to send in a registration card or register via the web. If you are pre-registering for the 2004 convention, you'll automatically be put on the mailing list for next year. If you are not pre-registered, pick up a registration card during the convention at the registration or T-shirt table and **MAIL** it in.

CONFIRMATIONS: We will **NOT** confirm registrations. You will only hear from us in the event that we are unable to fulfill your registration request.

HORSESHOE PITCHING CONTEST

The 7th-Annual Stellafane horseshoe pitching contest is scheduled to begin at 1:30 p.m. Friday near the McGregor Observatory. There will be adult and kid's competitions. "Astro" prizes will be awarded. The winner of the kid's competition will receive a telescope kit from "Stargazer" Steve Dodson and will build the telescope Saturday.

JEANNE KRZYWICKI ATM LIBRARY

The Jeanne Krzywicki ATM library, in the McGregor Observatory, will be open from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. both Friday and Saturday and in the evening if it's cloudy.

HARTNESS HOUSE

The Hartness Museum of Amateur Telescope Making is located in the underground rooms of the Hartness Turret Telescope at the Hartness House in Springfield, VT. Conventioneers can plan a visit to the museum on Friday or Sunday. Please consult the map on the back page for directions and follow the signs in town. Admission is **FREE**. Many of the items on display are by or about Russell W. Porter. Included are 'scopes of his design like the Springfield and Garden telescopes. His artwork traces his arctic exploration years to his work on the 200" Palomar telescope, culminating in his famous cutaway drawings. Other items of interest are 'scopes and other equipment built by early STM members. The 10" refracting turret telescope can also be inspected.

FRIDAY EVENING TALKS

Friday evening, August 14th, at 8:30 p.m. Bob Morse, of the *Springfield Telescope Makers*, will conduct the informal talks under the tent located in the main camping/parking area. If you wish to contribute a short talk during this session, you must submit a brief description of your planned presentation with your registration payment or at www.stellafane.com. Talks are limited to 10 minutes and 20 slides. The time limit will be strictly enforced! A 35-mm slide projector, overhead projector, VCR and a digital projector will be available for your use. Note that if you plan to use the digital projector you must bring your own laptop.

SWAP TABLES

The swap tables are where Conventioneers can trade or sell their surplus astronomical and telescope-related items. These tables are not for commercial sales. Participants are allowed a maximum 4-foot-square area and must be responsible for their own material. The swap tables operate all day Saturday from 7 a.m. until 5 p.m. at the NORTHEAST edge of the main camping/parking area.

If you will be in the telescope competition, you are encouraged to register via www.stellafane.com. Note that you must still check in at the Pink Clubhouse before the competition or your telescope will not be judged!

POLICIES REGARDING OPTICAL JUDGING ENTRIES

REGISTRATION for the optical competition will take place on Friday from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. in the Pink Clubhouse. In addition, you are encouraged to register your telescope via the Stellafane web page. Keep in mind that if you register your instrument via the web, you must still check in at the Pink Clubhouse Friday from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. or your telescope will not be judged! Set up your scope on Breezy Hill before you check in at the Pink Clubhouse and inform the judges of the location of your scope. If the position of your scope changes it is your responsibility to report its new location to the judges in the Pink Clubhouse. Failure to do so will result in your scope not being judged!

All telescopes in the competition must be fitted with an eyepiece with a focal length, in millimeters, approximately equal to the focal ratio of the instrument. Your instrument must be properly collimated before judging begins at 10 p.m. Also, be prepared to point your scope at the star Altair when the judges arrive. Please note that the judges may inspect your telescope more than once. Therefore, you should remain on the field with your instrument until the preliminary results are announced via loud speaker.

If the weather permits the completion of the judging on Friday night the optical judging will be closed for the duration of the convention and optical awards will be presented during the Saturday evening program. If the optical judging cannot be completed Friday night, it will be continued on Saturday night, weather permitting. Additional optical entries may be accepted on Saturday, at the discretion of the judges. To inquire about this possibility, please ask a judging representative in the Pink Clubhouse from 8:30 a.m. to 10 a.m. or from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Saturday.

In the event that the competition will have to be continued Saturday, some telescopes that were judged on Friday might need to be judged again. Please inquire with the judges if your scope will need to be available again on Saturday. If the optical judging cannot be completed by the end of Saturday night, a partial field of optical excellence awards may be given, at the discretion of the judges.

Please note that it is the intention of the Stellafane judging committee to have the optical competition completed Friday night, weather permitting. Therefore, to ensure that your instrument is judged you must be registered for the Friday night judging.

TELESCOPE MECHANICAL COMPETITION THE HEART AND SOUL OF STELLAFANE!

If you have built a telescope, special gadget or restored a historical instrument, we strongly encourage you to bring it and enter it in the competition. We welcome all homemade telescopes in the display area. They do not have to be entered in the competition!

REGISTRATION: Registration for the mechanical competition will be between 8:30 a.m. and 10 a.m. Saturday morning in the Pink Clubhouse. In addition, you are encouraged to register your telescope via the Stellafane web page. Keep in mind that if you register your instrument via the web, you must still check in at the Pink Clubhouse Saturday morning or your telescope will not be judged. You can drive up to the Pink Clubhouse area Fri. or Sat. to drop off and pick up your telescope but there is **no parking** as space is very limited. The telescope judging for mechanical excellence will begin at 10 a.m. so please register your telescope as early as possible.

COMPETITION: Only telescopes that are operative both mechanically and optically will be accepted in the mechanical competition. Telescopes do not have to be entered in both categories. The judges will visit the telescopes in several small groups. You should attend your telescope until the end of the competition is announced via the loud speaker! Be prepared to describe any special construction techniques and components to the judges. Awards for mechanical design, craftsmanship, special gadgets, restoration of historical instruments and junior telescopes, made by persons less than 16 years of age, will be awarded at the Saturday evening talks.

ENTRANCE POLICY

Anyone arriving after 10 p.m. on Friday will not be admitted unless they are pre-registered or have already checked in. If you plan to arrive between 10 p.m. Friday and 7 a.m. Saturday you **MUST** be pre-registered!

STELLAFANE LIGHTING POLICY

Stellafane does not allow open white lights, on clear nights, except for ½ hour after the Friday and Saturday evening talks end. Vehicular travel after this time is strongly discouraged and is done only at the risk of the operator. We thank you for your cooperation.

CHILDREN'S GROUPS: School groups, scouts and similar children's groups are welcome. Groups absolutely must contact us prior to July 10th for pricing!

STELLAFANE PINK CLUBHOUSE AREA

The Clubhouse and the Turret Telescope are located at the summit of Breezy Hill. The shuttle bus will operate between this area and the main camping/parking area to aid you in your visit to the summit. The Turret Telescope will be operating during the day for solar viewing as well as observing at night. You can also visit the Pink Clubhouse throughout the Convention. Telescopes, some of which will be participating in the mechanical and/or optical competition, will be set up in the observing fields. **The optical competition will begin Friday evening at 10 p.m.** The mechanical competition will take place Saturday morning starting at 10 a.m. There will also be several historical telescopes set up near the Clubhouse, including Stellafane's original solar projection telescope.

CONVENTION SITE INFORMATION

The INFORMATION CENTER is located next to the Bunkhouse in the main camping/parking area coincident with the T-shirt table.

PHONE SERVICE: There is a pay telephone located in the Bunkhouse that is available for use by Conventioneers.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE: There are several doctors at the Convention site on call at all times. They can be contacted at the Pink Clubhouse or the Information Center. There are first-aid kits located at both locations in addition to telephones to contact the local hospital. Please report to either location with any medical emergency.

CONVENTION STAFF are identified by their **light-blue** T-shirts with the Stellafane logo on the front and *Springfield Telescope Makers* on the back. Locations that are continuously staffed by convention personnel are the Pink Clubhouse, the registration table and the Bunkhouse. Please report to any of these locations with questions.

RAFFLE DRAWING: There is a raffle drawing Saturday evening just before the keynote talk. You can see what prizes will be raffled and buy tickets at the T-shirt table.

WHERE TO SET UP YOUR TELESCOPE

We strongly recommend that you set up your telescope in the fields around the Pink Clubhouse or in the field to the south of the McGregor Observatory. You may not set up your telescope in a designated parking area. Please consult the site map, which you will receive when you arrive, or the signs posted throughout the convention site for the designated parking locations.

FOOD SERVICE & COOKING

Breakfast, lunch and dinner are available at the food tent next to the Bunkhouse. There is also limited ice available. If you choose not to make use of the food service you must make provisions for your own food and water -- there are supermarkets downtown. Cooking is allowed in the camping area. Camp stoves, charcoal grills and the like are allowed but no campfires!

A NOTE TO FIRST-TIMERS

If this is your first visit to the Stellafane convention, especially if you are camping, there are several things you should know. First, our camping is very primitive. Only portable chemical toilets are available. You should bring vour own drinking water. There are no showers, no electrical hookups and no isolated campsites. You are likely to be camping back-to-back with others. While this usually makes for good friendships it can cause other side effects. The Convention site is often hot and dusty. Furthermore, the land is all carved out of rugged Vermont hillside. Bring comfortable clothes and walking shoes. Sunscreen by day and insect repellent by night should be the first order of business and always be prepared for a possible thunder shower. Bring a RED FILTER for your flashlight! If you forget to bring a red filter you can stop by the T-shirt table or the Pink Clubhouse to get one. Please see the Food Service & Cooking section for food accommodations. We do our best to see that everyone has a happy and comfortable convention but don't be surprised by our rustic conditions -they are part of the Stellafane tradition.

THE ULTIMATE STAR PARTY?

Although the oldest and perhaps best known, the Stellafane Convention is but one of the growing number of astronomy conventions in North America. Our reputation, and the fact that publications list the Stellafane convention along with star parties in their calendars of events, causes some people to arrive at the meeting expecting the ultimate observing experience. In truth, the Stellafane convention began in 1926 as a meeting of amateur telescope makers. There has always been observing but it does not have the emphasis that it does at gatherings such as the Texas Star Party or Florida's Winter Star Party. The convention is on the outskirts of town and minor light pollution is visible in the sky over Stellafane.

STELLAFANE EAST MAIN CAMPING/PARKING AREA

Work continues on the land purchased 18 years ago for the convention by the Springfield Telescope Makers. After a decade of limited space we can now accommodate all conventioneers who request a camping site and we hope this will continue. Nevertheless, camping and parking space will still be tight. People interested in camping must read the special instructions in the registration section of this mailing. Controlled traffic is allowed to the Pink Clubhouse area for unloading and picking up telescopes. Unless otherwise allowed by a Convention official, there is no parking around the Pink Clubhouse. There is no assurance that light-free conditions will be maintained in the main camping/parking area. If you must avoid lights please bring your telescope to the telescope fields by the Pink Clubhouse. We ask that Conventioneers who are not camping to please try to park in the day parking sections. Campfires are not permitted.

THE FLANDERS PAVILION

Following the tradition set down by our founder, Russell W. DIRECTIONS FROM I-91:

Take Exit 7 to Route 11 West. Staying on Route 11 for 4.5 miles, you'll come to the Springfield Plaza and McDonald's in the center of town (see map below). 1 1/2 miles past McDonald's on Route 11, look for a sign that will point to the left turn at Breezy Hill Road which will take you up to the Convention site. Note that the Breezy Hill Road turn off of Route 11 is directly across from "Green Mountain Classic Cars." If you see the Palomar Motel on the right you've gone too far on Route 11. Head straight up the hill. The road will come to a "T" just past the end of the pavement, make a right. Then, make the first left. You'll quickly come to a SHARP RIGHT turn, be careful! Go up the hill to the registration booth.
